Online Safety Legislative Reform

Women's Legal Service NSW (WLS NSW) thanks the Department of Communications and the Arts for the opportunity to comment on the Online Safety Legislative Reform Discussion Paper of December 2019.

- 1. WLS NSW is a community legal centre that aims to achieve access to justice and a just legal system for women in NSW. We seek to promote women's human rights, redress inequalities experienced by women and to foster legal and social change through strategic legal services, community development, community legal education and law and policy reform work. We prioritise women who are disadvantaged by their cultural, social and economic circumstances. We provide specialist legal services relating to domestic and family violence, sexual assault, family law, discrimination, victims support, care and protection, human rights and access to justice.
- We welcome the initiative to bring together the separate components of the existing regulatory framework into a single Act. This has the benefit of being better able to adapt to new and emerging forms of online harms, and making the protective functions easier for victims to access.
- However, we are concerned that the proposed regime of 'expectations' of online service
 providers to deliver improved safety outcomes lacks sufficient enforceability to be
 effective. We have not found self-regulation and voluntary codes of conduct to be





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effective as a means of protecting victims of domestic violence from harassment to

date. For example, our efforts at encouraging telecommunications service providers to

use the provisions of their Life-threatening and Unwelcome Calls Code to assist victims

have been unsuccessful.

5. In summary, we recommend that the establishment of the new Online Safety Act be

accompanied by a robust and readily enforceable regulatory regime. This should include

criminal remedies for non-compliance with directions and a requirement to act quickly

to remove harmful content, as outlined in our submission referred to above.
